In 2024, we submitted funding requests for the creation of 40 new housing units in the municipalities of Sherbrooke, Longue-Rive, Grand-Remous, and La Tuque—places where the needs are urgent, and where each new unit makes a real difference. We are hopeful for positive responses, as we represent a concrete solution to the housing crisis affecting our cities.

It's worth remembering that our contribution extends far beyond housing. We provide personalized support to each tenant—the human and social dimension is at the heart of who we are. By remaining attentive and present, we ensure our tenants don't just find shelter, but peace of mind.

Here is an overview of what we have accomplished.

A HOLISTIC APPROACH TO SUPPORT AUTONOMY

2012

Corporation Waskahegen offers an integrated range of services—including architecture, housing improvement, project management, economic development, and social/community support—to meet the immediate needs of offreserve Indigenous people, while empowering Indigenous youth to build the future with confidence.

SINCE 2003

FERNAND CHALIFOUX FOUNDATION: OVER \$100,000 FOR INDIGENOUS YOUTH

The foundation awards tens of thousands of dollars in scholarships to young Indigenous people, including students like Lauren Shattler, a single mother who became paraplegic and was able to complete a degree in business administration thanks to a \$6,000 grant.

2011

FERNANDE BOURASSA PARK IN LA TUQUE

Corporation Waskahegen is contributing to the creation of Fernande Bourassa Park (\$66,000), a space dedicated to Indigenous youth and honoring the legacy of a pioneering community leader.

2010

PILOT PROJECT FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT WITH SOLAR WATER HEATERS

An innovative pilot project led to the installation of 12 solar water heaters and 24 solar panels in two buildings in Québec City, with the goal of reducing electricity consumption. The \$90,000 project is 50% subsidized.

The past year was marked by a renewed focus on what truly matters. In an everchanging environment, Habitat Métis du Nord made the conscious choice to slow down—not to do less, but to do better.

By taking the time to think deeply about our mission, our impact, and our ways of working, we strengthened our commitment to off-reserve Indigenous people.

With more than 2,200 housing units across Quebec and funding from our partners—the SHQ and the CMHC—for the renovation of our buildings, we continued our work with diligence, respect, and humanity. Every action we take aims to provide a safe and lasting home.

For the year 2024, we received an initial budget of \$3,121,415.00, followed by an additional allocation of \$1,860,800.00 later in the year.

In addition, a project in the Rouyn-Noranda region was carried out under the PRHLM program with a budget of \$1,389,664.00, aimed at carrying out all necessary work to maintain and upgrade our assets.

In 2025, four more projects of this kind will be launched.

For us, focusing on the essentials means centering our efforts on what truly matters: the well-being of our tenants, the quality of their living environment, and the sustainability of our infrastructure.

Thank you to everyone who contributes—whether directly or indirectly—to this mission.







This year, guided by the theme "Pause, Reflect, Focus on what truly matters" has offered us a valuable space to take a step back and reassess our ways of doing things.


The Legal Department plays a vital role within Corporation Waskahegen and Habitat Métis du Nord. While its responsibility for handling the organization's legal files is self-evident, its mission goes far beyond that.

First and foremost, we act as legal advisors to the organization. In this role, and in collaboration with senior management and the board of directors, we ensure that the organization operates in compliance with the current legal framework—both in its economic activities involving clients and partners, and in its labor relations with employees. We also ensure that the organization's practices and procedures are regularly updated in line with evolving laws, standards, and applicable regulations.

The Legal Department is also here to advise employees and support management in their day-to-day work. Our team frequently assists staff by answering questions, guiding them through proper procedures, and providing the support needed to carry out their responsibilities. We are committed to equipping employees with the tools and resources necessary to enforce rules in a way that aligns with the organization's values.

Naturally, managing legal proceedings before the Tribunal Administratif du Logement (TAL) accounts for a significant part of our workload. Like previous years, the period since our last annual report has been exceptionally busy.

Cases Tribunal administratif du logement



We opened 198 cases before the Tribunal Administratif du Logement. While this represents a decrease compared to 2023, it remains higher than the 10-year average of 163 cases. The number of hearings follows the same trend.

Several external factors—such as the rising cost of living and the housing shortage—continue to influence the number of cases requiring legal intervention.

We remain sensitive to the difficulties faced by our clients and make every effort to help tenants resolve their situations before initiating legal action. We consistently prioritize negotiated payment agreements. However, in certain cases, filing a claim with the Tribunal becomes the only viable option to remain responsible managers and ensure the long-term sustainability of our housing stock.

Despite the fast pace of life and the many external factors beyond our control that nonetheless affect our work, we make it a point to reflect regularly in order to find the best path forward in fulfilling our primary mission: helping Indigenous families.

It is essential to me that the Legal Department remains compassionate and attentive—to both employees and tenants. I am proud to work with a skilled and dedicated team that shares these values and is committed to providing the highest quality service.
